Role-specific information

Role Summary

Applications are sought for a Research Assistant position at CUED (Signal Processing and Communication Laboratory SigProC) as part of a project funded by the Defence Science and Technology Laboratory (Dstl) via the MOD WSRF framework managed by QinetiQ. The project will involve collaborating with Dstl, QinetiQ and WSRF industrial partners. Its overall objective is to enable improved resource allocation and threat detection-mitigation for future (generation-after-next) seekers or sensors onboard fast-moving platforms.

In this project, tracking and intent prediction algorithms that can adapt to dynamically changing complex cluttered environments, degraded sensor accuracy (for example, due to countermeasures employed by the tracked objects) and elaborate evasive target manoeuvres will be developed and evaluated. This can provide a key new capability that provides seeker systems with a more holistic understanding of the observed scene and an effective means to prioritise and accordingly mitigate potential threats.

The project will also involve generating representative synthetic data for the considered tracking scenarios. Real data might be available to evaluate the developed techniques. This will necessitate close collaboration and liaising with Dstl and WSRF industrial partners. Due to the nature of the work, only UK, EU and NATO countries nationals might be considered for this post.

The applicant should have a very good first degree in engineering, computer science or a closely related field, and hold a Masters in Statistical Signal Processing, statistics, mathematics, Machine Learning or a closely related field. Demonstrable interest and experience in the areas (one or more) of object tracking, intent prediction, Bayesian inference, radar, and sensor data fusion are essential as well as solid programming/ modelling skills in an appropriate software tool, e.g., Matlab/Python/ C++.

The researcher will be expected to attend all the joint meetings or workshops with Dstl and WSRF industrial partners (if relevant) and participate in monthly teleconferences. They will also play a major role in liaising with Dstl and WSRF industrial partners and should ideally have collaboration experience.
